KANGNI ALEM



Born in Lomé, Togo, in 1966, Kangni Alem is a writer, translator and literary critic, playwright, art collector and exhibition curator, director of the "Atelier Théâtre de Lomé" founded by him in 1989. He has received numerous awards, including the Grand prix littéraire d'Afrique noire for his book Cola Cola jazz, the Tchicaya U'Tamsi Prize of the Concours Théâtral Interafricain for his play Chemins de Croix and more recently the 3rd Prize of the Williams Sassine Literary Prize for his short story Une histoire américaine. He is an associate researcher at the CELFA (Centre d'Études Linguistiques et Littéraires Francophones et Africaines) at the University of Bordeaux III and is currently editor-in-chief of the review Notre Librairie and translator of the writer Ken Saro-Wiwa. Kangni Alem is a lecturer in comparative literature and theatre pedagogy at the University of Lomé. He directs the professional Master's programme, and has been working for the last few years on the mediation between literature, visual arts and performance.

Viviane de Freitas is an associate professor of English and Literature of the Center for Culture, and Applied Technologies Languages at Universidade Federal do Recôncavo da Bahia, (CECULT-UFRB). Member of the Brazil CECULT/UFRB English Language Extension Program (PROELI). Coordinator of the research project The multiple temporalities and the body in the works of contemporary Afro-Brazilian female artists from Bahia-Brazil and a collaborator in the research project Critical studies in literatures of the Recôncavo da Bahia (UFRB). Member of the research groups FIPE – Formation and Investigation in Teaching Practices (UFRB), Poieticas - Gender, Body, Culture and Subjectivity (UFRB) and Mulheres na Literatura - Maria Firmina dos Reis (UNIFAP/UNIFAL). Served as deputy-director of Center for Culture, Languages and Applied Technologies (05/2019-09/2021), Extension manager at CECULT/UFRB (07/2018-05/ 2019), and General coordinator of the Languages without Borders Program at UFRB (MEC/SESU/CAPES) (05/2017-07/2018).

Born in France of Martinican descent, Fabienne Kanor is a novelist and a filmmaker, and the author of several novels. Awarded Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres by the French Minister of Culture, she also received the Fetkann Award for her novel D'Eaux Douces (Gallimard, 2004), the RFO Literary Award for Humus (Gallimard, 2006), and the Grand Prix Carbet for Faire l'aventure (Lattes, 2014). Her most recent novel entitled Je ne suis pas un homme qui pleure (Lattes, 2016) talks about being a Black female writer in France and what is left when a man runs away, when love dies. In her work, she engages with the burden of collective memory on individual identity formation, the male/female love hate saga, West African immigration in Europe and the slave trade.

Patrice Kabeya Mwepu is the Head of the School of Languages & Literatures at Rhodes University. He holds a PhD in French Language and Literature. He is the Deputy-Editor of French Studies in Southern Africa (the only accredited journal for French Studies in Africa). He is a member of Board of *Écritures Plurielles* Editorial (an International academic journal published by the Université Cheikh Anta Diop). He seats in the Scientific Committee of Les annales de l'Université de Mbuji-Mayi. He has reviewed papers for Equid Novi and French papers submitted to Tydskrif vir Letterkunde. He is a member of several bodies, including the American Association of Teachers of French, French Studies in Southern Africa. International Federation of French Teachers, etc.

Babacar Mbaye Diop holds a PhD in Philosophy from Rouen University. He is currently associate professor of Aesthetics, Philosophy of Art and Culture at the Department of Philosophy, Cheikh Anta Diop University of Dakar where he coordinates the seminar on aesthetics. One of his latest works is Critique de la notion d'art africain (A Critique of the Notion of African Arts), published in 2018. He has curated several exhibitions, individually and collectively in Senegal and elsewhere. A former director of the Dakar Biennale, he has authored several articles and books on African arts. He is also a member of the International Association of arts critics (AICA) and president of the Senegalese Association of Arts Critics (ASCA).

Wilfried N'Sondé is a prolific writer, musician, author and composer. Born in 1968 in Brazzaville, he studied political science in Paris before moving to Berlin, where he stayed for 25 years. He now lives in Lyon. In 2016, he taught literature at the University of Bern as a visiting professor. He is currently a lecturer at the University of Mayotte. As a writer, he publishes his work with Actes Sud, and his novels have been translated into several languages. He has won several renowned awards, including the Prix des Cing Continents de la Francophonie and the Prix Senghor de la création littéraire for Le Cœur des enfants léopards (2007), the Prix Ahmadou Kourouma for Le silence des esprits. And numerous other awards for *Fleur de béton* (2012) and Berlinoise (2015) and Un océan, deux mers, trois continents (2018). His most recent novel is entitled Femme du ciel et des tempêtes.

Jonas do Nascimento is a Brazilian sociologist and interdisciplinary researcher. He completed his PhD in Sociology/African Studies at PPGS, Universidade Federal de Pernambuco (Brazil) in 2019 and was Associated Research Fellow at BIGSAS, University of Bayreuth (Germany), 2017-2019. His research interests lie in Culture, Racism, and (De-)Coloniality; Art and Politics; Media and Representativeness; Brazilian and Latin America studies. Some of his outstanding articles include Recognition, Redistribution and Justice in Axel Honneth and Nancy Fraser in Problemata: International Journal of Philosophy" (2018) and Africa as discursive and media construction: colonial propaganda and the 'invention' of the 'other (2017).

Ashanti Dinah Orozco-Herrera is a doctoral student in the Department of African and African American Studies with a primary field in Romance Languages & Literatures. She has a degree in Education from the Universidad del Atlántico (Barranquilla-Colombia) and a Master's degree in Hispanic Literature from the Instituto Caro y Cuervo (Bogotá). Her research has focused on investigating and analyzing the literary works of Afro-Latin American authors, mainly from the Caribbean, from the perspective of the sociocriticism of literature, cultural studies, postcolonial, decolonial and feminist; and they have also focused on investigating how language, ideology and racism circulate in school textbooks to reveal ideologies, strategies of power, manipulation and reproduction of stereotypes and ethnic asymmetries. She is the author of the collection of poems Las Semillas del Muntu (The seeds of Muntu) in 2019. She won the Benkos Bioh Award in 2016 as well as the Afrodescent Women Recognition Award in 2019.

Javier Ortiz holds a PhD in History from the Colegio de México, a Master's degree in History of Universidad de los Andes and he is Historian at the Universidad de Cartagena. He is a specialist in the history of culture and history of Afro-descendants and has published widely in that field. He has been an advisor on issues of heritage and Afro-descendant population of the Ministry of Culture. Author of the books *El incómodo color de la memoria, Un diablo al que le llaman tren,* and co-author of *Desorden en la plaza.* In 2014, he received the Afro-Colombian Prize of the year. He also works as a columnist of the newspapers *El Espectador* and *El Malpansante.*

Josias Semujanga is a full professor in the Department of Literature at the University of Montreal, where he teaches Francophone African and Caribbean literatures. After a BA in literature (University of Burundi, 1986), an MA (1989) and a PhD (1992) at Laval University, and post-doctoral research (Laval University and Paris IV-Sorbonne University, 1992-1994), Josias Semujanga has worked as a professor at the National University of Rwanda and at the University of Western Ontario. His areas of research are the history of criticism, theories of the novel and narratives of genocide and mass violence. His main publications include Qu'est-ce qu'un texte francophone ? Mélanges offerts à Christiane Ndiaye (2021); Le roman francophone et l'archive coloniale (with Philippe Basabose) (eds.), 2020; Narrating Itsembabwoko. When Literature becomes Testimony of Genocide, 2016; Le génocide, sujet de fiction ? Analyse des récits du massacre des Tutsi dans la littérature africaine, 2008; Origins of the Rwandan Genocide, 2003.
